

Candidates vie for trustee position

The college's student board of trustee member position will be up for vote on Wednesday, March 10, when polls open from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the IC/SRC 2nd floor foyer.

The student trustee member is a position who serves a one year term and has the job of representing the students opinion to the board of trustees.

The student trustee is given all the rights, privileges and responsibilities of board members except the student trustee can't introduce or second motions regarding the sale of bonds, be counted to establish a quorum or cast an official vote.

The student trustee is able to give an advisory vote before the board votes but that vote does not officially count.

There are two students who are officially running for the one year term which begins during the first board meeting in April.

The Courier editorial staff recently had the opportunity to interview both candidates who are running for the position.

The following information is presented in alphabetical order and hopes to give students an insight of the candidates.

Sonya Hira is a 21 year old college student who lives in Wheaton. She is currently studying hospitality management and wants to eventually own her own hotel.

Hira said a reason she is running for the board is because she will get exposed to a diverse group of people if she is elected.

If elected Hira hopes she can be as successful as current student trustee Rebecca Fyffe. "I just want to continue the good work which Rebecca has already started." said Hira.

already started," said Hira.
When asked what qualifications she has which would make her a good candidate for the position Hira replied that she speaks five different languages and has a passion for working with people and the college.

"I have the desire to return back to this college 100 fold what it has given me," said Hira.

"I would be a truthful and honest messenger to the board of trustees." Hira also stated that she would do her best to accomplish what ever needed to be accomplished.

Although Hira was not knowledgeable about of current issues being discussed by the board she said if she is elected she will become current on the issues of the board.

Hira said that because she is a student, she will have an instant connection with the student body if elected. "I'm an active member of the student society, and I will develop the rest of the skills needed for the position if elected."

Alice Liang is a 20 year old computer engineering major who moved to the United States from Taiwan one year

While in Taiwan Liang held the position of finance president at her highschool and was the student chairman of the mathematics department.

Liang is currently a student senator and a member of the problems committee. She said the reason she is a candidate in the race is because she believes the student trustee can help influence the board of trustees decisions.

Liang believes she is qualified for the position because she knows how the Student Government Association (SGA) works and since the student trustee works closely with the SGA she feels she has an upper hand on making the transition. "I think the transition would be tough on someone who is not familiar with the SGA," said Liang.

If elected Liang wants to try and keep tuition at the same cost that it is at. Liang understands that her opinion might not stop the board from raising tuition but she at least wants to try and use the money for bringing students together.

Liang also mentioned she would like to try and prevent classes from getting cut due to low enrollment. Often if classes get cut due to low enrollment they are not offered at another time. "I would like to try and help students keep their schedules flexible so it would be better for them

Liang also wants to try and make sure technology in all labs are up to date.

to learn," said Liang.

"Even if I can't make these changes happen, the board will realize what we (students) are thinking," said Liang.

"The student trustee is there to represent the student and give the board a students opinion. The job is to make a rational environment for the students to learn in."

Liang concluded the interview by stressing the importance of the students ability to vote. She believes the students should realize that any decision made by the board will effect the student population.





Free Tax **Assistance**

In continuing with the college tradition of offering help to students and residents of the community, the accounting 208 Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) class is offering free tax return preparations on Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. in the SRC cafeteria until March 20.

The VITA Tax class is taught by six year part time faculty member, Sue Stockin, and is associated with the

The IRS supplies the class with text books and all the other materials needed to provide the public with tax

Stockin, a seven year Certified Public Account (CPA), has been teaching the VITA Tax class for the past three years at the college.

The class teaches students how to provide correct tax return preparation through six classes which are filled with intensive instruction.

Before the students can volunteer they must pass three sperate tests mandated by the IRS.

Stockin said the free tax preparations are for anyone who has a yearly income of less than \$50,000 and has basic tax returns.

Students or community members interested in using the volunteers are asked to bring in their W2 and 1099 forms. Students are also asked to bring in a record of how many credited classes they took in 1998 for possible exemptions thanks to the Hope Scholarship credit and the Lifetime Learning credit.

Stockin said it usually takes from half an hour to an hour to complete all the preparations. "The amount of time it takes to file depends on the complexity of the return."

Since Feb. 20, the first Saturday which students helped community members file their taxes, there has been 20 to 30 people who have come to the college to get their taxes pre-

Stockin added that many people show up just to ask questions and get tax forms free of charge. Forms offered to the public are:

"The students have been well trained and their work is always revised by another student and myself," said Stockin.

The class is only held during tax season so the next time it will be in the school's curriculum is in the winter quarter of 2000.





Dear Editor:

I would like to express my dissatisfaction in the hiring process recently demonstrated to me and, I am sure, to many others in the past.

I applied for the football coaching position posted near the end of November by Human Resources. I received a card mailed December 18 saying, "We have received the application materials submitted by you...You will be contacted after due consideration."

You can imagine my shock and disbelief when I picked up the local paper on Friday, February 12. The new coach had been hired and I had not heard a word or been contacted. In fact, since there was no ending date for applications posted, I did not even know how the application process had been closed.

I am not upset that I did not get the job. I'm not even upset that I didn't get an interview. (They should have given the job to former coach Bob MacDougall anyway.) I AM DISGUSTED THAT NO ONE HAD THE COURTESY OR TOOK THE TIME TO NOTIFY ME. What happened to: "You will be contacted after due con-

sideration"? I talked to Cherryl Johnson and Howard Owens in Human Resources. Both were very cordial and understanding. In fact, they informed me that usually the policy was to notify non-selected applicants prior to the actual hiring.

In the local paper Athletic director Ralph Miller had stated that the new coach was one of four final candidates for the post, and President Mike Murphy had said the coach was the most qualified candidate. Does this not mean the other 26 (or more) applicants are not finalist and should already have been notified as such before going to the Board of Trustees?

The principle of the thing is: THIS IS NO WAY TO TREAT PEOPLE! I hold the BOARD OF TRUSTEES responsible and hope they hold the President and Athletic Director responsible for correcting this situation and treating people the right way: with appreciation of their efforts and the usual courtesy of proper notification.

After this, why would any parttime faculty member want to apply for a full-time position here?



COD's Augie Schmidt and Dan Monahan of "The Dog and Everything" have not only the attitude to express rock music at its freshest, but also the talent to shoot it forward into the spot-

"We'd like to make a long career out of it and do it professionally," says Monahan, singer and songerwriter of the group. "We've been friends for about a decade, and have been through the New American many bands together, now we're doing Chamber Orchestra. our own thing with me on vocals."

The Dog and Everything seem to bring a new approach to a world soaked in the pessimistic views of bands like Korn and Marylon Manson, providing a shimmering light at the end of music's current dark tunnel.

"I've learned to appreciate song writing in the past year. Classic songwriting like the Beatles show more than individual virtuoso soloists that can just shred but can't write," said Schmidt.

This focus can be heard when listening to the band, with well structured songs that make you guess where it will end up and melodies that leave you craving for one more chorus.

"It's very melodic music, where the melody can be clearly heard and not rapped as much," says Monahan. "It's basically funky melodic-- melodic funk!"

'October' reaches for the stars

"October Sky" Starring Jake Gyllenhaal, Chris Cooper, Laura Dern



Most of today's movie tearkerkers end up being so full of pretension and phony baloney earnestness that viewers practically choke on the sentiment being jammed down their throats.

"Simon Birch" was one such movie and "Patch Adams" was another. "October Sky" could easily have gone down a similar path, but thankfully it doesn't.

Make no mistake, it's wholesome. Unapologetically so. But it never lets the drama of its scenario descend into melodrama, and therein lies its strength.

There's nothing particularly new or groundbreaking being presented here. It's not big and it's not bold. It's the true story of young Homer Hickam Jr. (Jake Gyllenhaal), following his dream to become a rocket scientist following the launch of *Sputnik* in the 1950s, all the while being encouraged by the teacher who never

stops believing in him (Laura Dern).

Despite the trigonometric equations and rocket launches that abound, what is at the core of the film, a richly moving and passionate work from director Joe Johnston, is the struggle between Homer and his father (Chris Cooper).

Coming as he does from a small town where no one is expected to do anything but mine coal, Homer is a revolutionary, and like most revolutionaries he is ridiculed by his fellows and prevented from pursuing his dream.

In a film world that's becoming increasingly harsh and bitter, (last weekend's "8MM" comes to mind most readily), it's refreshing to know that movies like "October Sky" can still exist.

At the forefront of the film's very human characters is Jake Gyllenhaal as Homer. Gyllenhaal is something of a revelation in a Hollywood overflowing with young actors full of style but with very little substance (think: Ryan Phillippe).

There is a wondrous glimmer in the actor's eyes as he watches the

shimmering spectre of *Sputnik* passing overhead that is truly magical.

Equally affecting is Chris Cooper, playing his character as a man who is not only admirable and honorable, but one who loves his children very much. The rapport between Gyllenhaal and Cooper makes for one of the most real and affecting fatherson relationships committed to film.

There is an innocence about the film, from the small town setting to the lead character's youthful enthusiasm that's especially welcome in these increasingly jaded times. Put simply, "October Sky" is a great movie, the kind that restores one's faith in the power of cinema. It deserves to be cherished and treasured. A-



She has studied with great performers of our time including David Cerone, Sylvia Rosenberg, Claude Letourneau and at the St. Louis Conservatory where she earned a graduate diploma.

The concerto Lekas is forefronting is a popular favorite from composer Max Bruch. The concerto gives such a broad openness such that a forum opens up in the listener's mind.

This "freeness" given off from the piece concerned Bruch so much that he almost thought it best not to merit the title "concerto" at all.

After assurance from Josheph Joachim, the great violinist to whom this work and the Brahms violin concerto were dedicated to, set his mind at ease to title it indeed a concerto.

Bruch's popular status among musical elites of our time is very minimal-- hardly the fate he deserves.

The suggestion that Bruch was trapped between Romanticism and Classicism is a fair one.

Bruch both participated in the two forms partially and some times not either of them-- weaving his own style into the musical stream.

Unfortunately the attention that Bruch deserved was not given until our modern day.

Yet even today, with the composer's substantial output of works, this concerto is primarily what he is most known and respected for.

Along with the vibrant concerto of Bruch is Gustav Mahler's pivotal symphony No. 5.

Despite his position as one of the most famous conductors of his time, Mahler's music was not widely performed and he was not at all regarded as a great composer at the time of his death

He was knownprimarily as a conductor, and it was less known that he had a stable of gargantuan symphonies to credit, and most audiences had never heard any of those symphonies.

Much of Mahler's early career was dominated by his job as conductor of the Vienna Opera. He wrote much of his music while on summer holiday.

It would be safe to say that Mahler's life and work was greatly unappreciated until after his death.

His relentless apsiration to the highest of ideals makes his music a testimony to his constant quest to follow the voice that screamed inside himhis whole life.

The fifth symphony stands at a pivotal point in Mahler's work. This symphony was the first to dodge direct reference to the songs of Wunderhorn and the poems of Rueckert.

The symphony is both long and plush, with a wide range of instruments directing the melodies to dance in the chambers of the audience's ears. A profound enjoyment indeed.

The five movements of the "5th" evoke a strong array of many feelings: from concise and strong to fresh and vigorous it covers it all.

The two performances act like a double-barrelled shotgun that will plunge deep into our souls and awaken even the smallest of our musical voices.

It follows the life of a woman born into a deep Southern tradition, who was left motherless at age six, and who eventually married a powerful and commanding man.


